- Improve or maintain facilities and grounds

Efforts to Reduce the Budget

Capital Budget Reductions - \$282,790

- Remainder of exterior window flashing for middle school
- Replacing stair treads in the high school
- Student desks and chairs
- Purchasing a Ford F-150 to replace a ten year old district owned truck
- Purchasing a new tractor for grounds maintenance
- Equipment lift for grounds equipment

Operating Budget Drivers - Increases

- Health Insurance (7% increase)
- Contractual Salary Increases
- Special Education Purchased Services
- Technology Hardware & Software
- Transportation
- Utilities (water, sewer, propane, electricity)



Operating Budget Drivers - Reductions

- Special Education Outplacements
- Special Education Transportation
- Fuel (buses, generator, maintenance vehicles)



Operating Budget Drivers - Columbia Partnership

- RHAM High School will be a school of choice for Columbia ninth graders beginning in the 2025 2026 school year
- Columbia will pay base tuition price and additional costs for any specialized instruction/services (if provided)
- Columbia will provide transportation
- Anticipated tuition is factored into the Region 8 budget as revenue, reducing the member town levy paid towards the budget by Andover, Hebron, and Marlborough
- The budget reflects an anticipated revenue amount of eight (8) Columbia students choosing to attend RHAM High School next year



Operating Budget Drivers - Debt/Bond Payment

Principal/Interest Payments:

- 2023 2024 \$1,077,313
- 2024 2025 \$421,413 (reduction of \$655,900)
- 2025 2026 \$414,863 (reduction of \$6,550)
- 2026 2027 \$418,163 (increase of \$3,300 final year of payments)

Future Projects Requiring Bonding:

- Roofing
- Boilers, Chillers, & HVAC Controls
- Fire & Security Controls
- Loading Dock Area
- Tennis Courts & Fencing

2025 - 2026 Proposed Capital Budget

The proposed Capital budget is **<u>\$565,487</u>** and includes:

- Sidewalk repairs \$40,000
- Replacement of track \$525,487 (total cost \$1,584,330)
 - \circ 20 years old
 - Track has been resurfaced once (cannot be done again)
 - Track cannot be used for competitions in upcoming spring 2025 season due to its poor condition
 - Replacement project includes
 - Replacement of track foundation
 - Installation of D-Zone areas for field events
 - Replacement of fencing around track
 - Relocation of scoreboard (currently in D-Zone area)

- Safety/Security Officers (3.0 FTE)
- Athletic Trainer (1.0 FTE)

Reductions

- World Language Teacher (1.0 FTE)
- Special Education Paraeducators (2.0 FTE)
- Math Teacher (1.0 FTE)



Return on Investment - Academics

- Over 250 courses and 25 career pathways offered at high school
- Middle school SBAC/NexGen scores well above state averages
- 33 dual credit opportunities for high school students (38 next year)
- Middle school Inquiry Team provides for more personalized learning approach
- High school SAT scores well above state and national averages
- CTE courses provide desirable skills which prepare graduates to immediately enter the workforce in high-paying careers
- 375 high school AP tests taken 92% scoring level 3, 4, or 5
- RHAM High School is ranked 31st best high school in state (U.S. News & World



Report)

Return on Investment - Fine & Performing Arts

- RHAM has been recognized as a "Best Community for Music Education" for eight consecutive years
- 17 middle school students accepted to participate in Eastern Regional Middle School Music Educators Festival
- Six high school band members selected to perform with American School Band Directors Honor Band
- 21 high school musicians selected for CMEA All-State Honor Ensemble
- Four high school students submitted work to CT Celebration of Youth Photographers
- Students from both high school and middle school received Gold Key, Silver Key, and Honorable Mention at Scholastic Art Competition



Return on Investment - Athletics

- Three state championship teams (volleyball, wrestling, & ultimate frisbee)
- Two state runner-ups (cheerleading and baseball)
- Six CCC division champions
- One All-American
- 10 All-State
- 62 All-Conference
- 57 Triple Threat Athletes (three season athletes)
