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

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


WITH THE NIGHTMARE of the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget behind, so begins the process of the 2018-2019 budget. Hopefully all our residents are enjoying a relaxing summer!

With the adoption of the Town 2018-2019 budget of \$35,799,365, please bear in mind that the Town reduced its operating costs by \$395,862. We have once again eliminated some staff and combined responsibilities that may affect services. Everything will be a work in progress and staff will continue to present our community with all that is required and requested in our usual professional and efficient manner. To date, the State has left proposed grant revenues intact with no reductions. However, it is an election year and with new Officials taking office anything can happen.

The Finance Department would also like to inform all taxpayers that the Town of Hebron has once again been awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence

in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association for its comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR) for the fourteenth consecutive year. This award is the highest form of recognition for governmental accounting and financial reporting and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. A lot of hard work goes into maintaining a strong, precise general ledger and adherence to Municipal and Governmental policies and procedures. We pride ourselves in our performance.

On October 17th, the Finance Department shall participate in the "We are Hebron Civic Leadership Academy" in an attempt to further educate our residents with a better understanding of Municipal Government. Please watch for the various notifications involving this program scheduled to begin the week of September 26th. Come talk with staff!



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RECYCLE SMART — AND HELP AVOID FEES

The Town of Hebron was recently put on notice by Willimantic Waste, our trash and recyclables contractor, that we need to do a better job keeping unacceptable items out of our recycling bins. Currently, we are paid \$15/ton of clean recyclables to offset the cost of hauling our trash. If we continue to send contaminated recyclables, Willimantic Waste will begin charging us \$100/ton of recyclables for sorting at their facility. That's a huge price increase that we don't want to see happen!

The term "contamination" means non-recyclable goods that are thrown into recycling bins like plastic bags, styrofoam and dirty containers. The problem with contaminated recyclables is two-fold. First, the materials lose their value and potential for reuse in down stream markets. Second, the sorting process is completely halted when things like plastic bags become wound in the machinery and must be manually removed (see photo). Phoenix, AZ recently estimated that they spend \$1 million in lost labor per year simply un-clogging the machines.

Luckily, there are a couple easy steps we

could take to keeping our recycling rates the same. To start, rinse all containers before throwing them in the bin. Next, only put items that you know for sure belong in recycling (see chart, keep for reference!) Finally, don't put ANY plastic bags or plastic film/wrap in the recycling bin. This includes Ziploc bags and air pillows from your Amazon packages. It may be marked with the recycling logo but it has to be handled separately. Ted's has plastic film receptacles (white boxes) by the shopping carts. Or, take it a step further and consider reusable options for plastics around your home, like reusable shopping bags.

INVASIVE INSECTS AND ROADSIDE TREES

Have you noticed that there are more trees that seem to be dying lately? Our town, like many in the area, has been experiencing the effect of the Gypsy Moth Caterpillar and the Emerald Ash Borer. It is easy to see the increase of dying trees in our back yards and along the roadsides. Approximately four years ago, the Emerald Ash Borer was determined to be present in Hebron. This is a non-native, invasive insect that was found in the United States, first in the Midwest, and has since migrated to the East. It is presumed that this happened through the movement of firewood, packaging materials and nursery goods. According to the DEEP, their diet consists of Ash trees almost exclusively. Once they have infected a tree, we can expect to see the die off in the crown of the tree in as little as nine years. With the help of two of our local arborist's, Distinctive Tree Service and Connecticut Landscaping, we have inventoried our roadside ash trees so that we can better plan for future vegetation management. This inventory has determined that the Public Works Department has approximately 2300 Ash trees in various sizes that it will someday have to remove if they should die due to the Emerald Ash Borer. We can also see the effect of the Gypsy Moth along the roadside with the die back of the White Oaks. The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment center states that "they will feed on a wide diversity of trees and shrubs but Oaks are their preferred food plant". They can consume as much as one square foot of leaves per day. Our region has shown a major defoliation of trees by the Gypsy Moth. Some of the trees will regrow their leaves, but consistent outbreaks will eventually kill some of the trees. These are just two of the challenges we as a town face when managing our roadside forest. The Public Works Department will continue to address these problems as needed, and plan for other issues as they arise.

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SEPTEMBER THROUGH FEBRUARY is the busiest time within the Assessor's Office. October 1st is the assessment date which means that collecting data for improvements to real estate, and compiling both the motor vehicle and personal property lists is done over a short period of time. There are also quite a few filling deadlines for such things as; classification of land under PA490 (Farm & Forest) Sept. – Oct., veterans exemption by Sept. 30th, blind and totally disabled by Oct. 1st and farm building exemptions by Oct. 31st. Personal Property Declarations are sent out to businesses and due by Nov. 1st.

Also during October we receive the motor vehicle supplemental list for vehicles that were registered after the previous Oct. 1st assessment date. Pricing and adjustments to this list needs to be complete by early December so it can be forwarded to the Collector for bills. Once the supplemental list is done, we receive the regular motor vehicle list during the first week of December and that list gets prepared for the January 31st deadline of signing the Grand List. After the Lists are completed, notice must be sent to property owners that had an increase on either real estate or personal property. Reports are compiled for the Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance and the State of CT Office of Policy and Management.

Reminder; a motor vehicle that had been disposed of or registered out of state after October 1, 2017 may be entitled to a pro-rate on the tax bill. The bills that were due July 2018 are for vehicles registered from October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018. If you disposed of or registered a vehicle out of state, AND canceled the license plates any time during that assessment year, in order to have your bill pro-rated we require copies of the canceled plate receipt AND some form of documentation as to what happened to the vehicle. Please note that the DMV DOES NOT notify this office when the marker plates are canceled. As per §12-71c(b); in order to get a credit, documentation must be provided by December 31st immediately following the end of the assessment year which next follows the assessment year in which such vehicle is disposed of, ie.: for credits on the October 1, 2017 list, documentation must be received by December 31, 2019.

As always, the staff in the Assessor's Office is available to answer any questions or concerns you may have regarding the assessment process.





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ALONG WITH THE TAX COLLECTOR the municipal clerk is one of the oldest of public servants in local government. The profession traces back before biblical times and even before the written word there were "rememberers" whose memory served as the official public record. Because clergy during the middle ages were scholars whom could read and write they could serve as secretary, notary, account and recorder. The title "clerk" is derived from the Latin clericus or clergy.

So it is the Clerk of the town who is the keeper of the records. And hence to present day we find thousands of records in the vaults of the Town of Hebron. History hidden on sheets of paper pressed between bound and aged covers. The knowledge of those words remains undiscovered until curiosity chances upon one who will take the time to open those pages and read the faded letters which turn into words which turn into stories, some which are very remarkable.

One such book found in the archives of the Town Clerk's vault is a non-descript journal in green with the title "Hebron Recreation Council - 1967-1971 -Minutes of all meetings – Helen Hovey, Sec." Upon opening the blue lined journal the very beginnings of the now and ever popular Hebron Harvest Fair unfolds.

The council convened their first meeting at the house of Mrs. Richard Aiken on March 31, 1967. There was the usual talk most recreation committees undertake; land acquisition, sports, equipment needs, dances, swimming, open space, teen centers. In June, of that year they voted and accepted a mission statement or motto as they referred, "May the link never be broken".

In July 1967, the council first talked of a Harvest Festival. The intent was to produce some money to benefit the town's recreation organizations and to establish an annual community event. Minutes show that initially there were two locations for the festival. Dancing was very important during the late 1960's. Its popularity would draw a crowd and the early scheduled fairs had dances planned for both nights. A teen dance one evening and square dance the next. Ultimately, Gilead Hill School was chosen solely on the fact it provided a better dance floor.

With less than two months to prepare the Recreation Council scheduled the fair for September 20 & 21, 1968. A faded hand-typed half-sheet flyer indicates it was held on Friday from 6 pm – 11 pm and on Saturday from 10 am – 11 pm. Door donation was 10 cents and parking free!!! The flyer promotes A COUNTRY FAIR WITH PONY RIDES, DANCING AND GOOD FOOD. FUN FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY!! And each night a drawing was held with the winner needing to be present to collect the prize.

The first Harvest Fair was a natural success. Plans for the 1969 fair initiated and there was debate of changing the fair to the Fourth of July. Ultimately, it was decided that the holiday and the fair should be independent of each other.

For the next two years the council continued to work hard making necessary changes to improve areas. Council members were asked to bring their own picnic tables, they hung flood lights on the school roof to better illuminate the midway, hired a uniformed constable to oversee the drinking at teen dances, and they considered supplying telephones. Members suggested adding a firework show, sky divers, peanut hunts, renting a merry-go-round, and selling crab cakes and cider. They also discussed providing more pies for the revered pie eating contest, asked vendors to supply their own waste receptacles and their own lighting above the one bulb furnished by the council.

The American Legion served food and sold jewelry. Gilead Men's Fellowship sponsored a sit down meal consisting of baked beans, ham, coleslaw, rolls and coffee or milk. The band "Fire and Ice" was paid \$40 to play on Friday night for the teen dance and the Marlborough Fife and Drum made an appearance. Door prize tickets sold for 10 cents or 3 for 25 cents. The big door prize was a 14-inch portable television and second prize was a radio, though we aren't sure if the council chose a battery operated or electric.

Even a Fair Queen contest was held those first few years. Pictures of the contestants were displayed with containers. The picture that produced the most coin would be crowned winner by the first selectman Aaron Reid. Though there was no mention in the minutes to the numbers in attendance it obviously grew each year. Residents from New York, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont, and other surrounding states attended to participate in contests and be vendors.

After the third Harvest Festival in 1970, there was exchange between the remaining active members of inviting groups to manage specific activities. They had concerns that the fair might dissolve because they could not manage the fast growth and popularity. Their motto, established early on, was to keep the link unbroken. Their charge of providing a "fun affair to the town, where its groups could raise money and the Town's people got together" was in jeopardy. It was brought to the attention of the council that the Lion's Club was interested. Initially, many of the council members were not in favor of any group taking full control, but on February 24, 1971, by unanimous vote the Recreation Council gave the responsibilities of the Harvest Fair to the Lion's Club. The link is still unbroken as the Hebron Lion's Club works their magic each year as one of the largest agricultural fairs in Connecticut, setting attendance records, and booking award winning country performers. From its small, modest beginnings to present day extravaganza, long time secretary, Helen Hovey, wrote, "I do hope that someday the Lion's Club and the people of Hebron will realize it was a handful of public spirited people that started this event." Maybe now they do! And just think all of this knowledge from a book stored in the Clerk's office.

It must be noted that the Recreation Council and the Hebron Recreation Commission were two separate entities. The Hebron Parks & Recreation Commission was established in 1968 and members were appointed by the Town. The Recreation Council was a small group of individuals that tasked themselves with providing activities for youth and adults in our town.

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

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FIRE DEPARTMENT



RECENT CAR BREAK-INS: As many of you know the Town of Hebron was one of several area towns that recently was subject of cars being gone through and some were stolen. This message is a reminder of things you can do to help protect yourself and your property.

"Vehicle theft is a crime that hurts consumers and the economy," said Heidi King, NHTSA Deputy Administrator. "Lock your doors and never leave valuables inside, especially if they can be seen from outside the vehicle."

Don't leave anything on display in your car. Even an old coat on the back seat is a temptation for someone to "smash and grab." Thieves steal first and think about value later. Thieves will smash a car window just to look inside a bag or box to see if it contains anything of value. Even if it contains nothing, you will be left with a broken window or door lock. Take all your belongings with you when you leave the car.

Thieves are particularly attracted to:

- Cell phones, GPS receivers, laptops and iPods (or any other type of easy to sell electronics)
- Checkbooks, credit cards and debit cards or Cash (including loose change in the ashtray)
- Wallets and purses

Don't make the mistake of thinking that because you live in a low crime area, you can leave items in your car or leave car doors unlocked. Don't leave garage door activators in your parked car. Thieves will have easy access to your garage and sometimes your entire home if the door from the garage into your home interior is unsecured.

When you leave your car, always remove the ignition key and lock all doors. It only takes a few seconds for a thief to jump into your car and drive away. Follow this routine all the time, even when filling your car up with gas or just running into the store for a moment. At home, always keep your car keys in a safe place that is out of sight and away from windows and doors.



NEW EQUIPMENT: Hebron Police recently received our new Emergency Messaging Board/ Speed Sign Trailer. This trailer will be available to be used by many of the town departments including Public Works, Parks and Rec, Town Hall and CERT. We are working on a consistent location that the sign will be located in an emergency so the town can provide the residents with important up to date information. You will also see the trailer around town reminding you of the speed limit and your speed. You may see the trailer being used by Public Works to provide signage during construction and other departments for important messages throughout the year.

primed the chairs, and Scout leader Jason Pueschel, with Nathan Wheeler and Adam Lemieux, and parents, Todd Wheeler, Sara and Eric Lemieux, assembled them and Board member Susan Young and Bruce Olmstead, Kevin McDonnell, and Stu Alexander helped to screw in the 1352 screws of 4 different sizes!

For this year's Hebron Views back-to-school edition, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the community of Hebron for its continued investment in the welfare of our children. In addition, I would like to highlight several of our new initiatives that we hope will exceed High Expectations and secure the Bright Futures of our students.

As I have noted on many occasions, Hebron is a very special community because of the opportunities it makes available to its residents. I feel very fortunate to be serving as your superintendent of schools, and I can only hope that you view the efforts of our BOE, faculty and staff, and our partners in education as beneficial to the quality of life the community of Hebron provides to its residents. The vibrancy and attractiveness of the town is the result of the hard work and dedication of many, and we recognize the role our school district has in supporting the many agencies, departments, and volunteer committees that represent the interests of Hebron residents.

Each year, the administration of the school district provides an annual "Year in Review" during the September Board Of Education meeting. Over the past several months, we have been preparing the presentation and it has been inspiring to reflect on what we accomplished in 2017-2018. Although we are always planning for tomorrow, it helps to look back and see how far we have come. This year's presentation will also note our student performance gains on state assessments, and the strides we have made in meeting our Board Of Education goals, Strategic Operating Plan, District and School Advancement Plans, and our District Priorities.

As has been done the past three years, we have established a set of District Priorities to articulate our vision for 2018-2019. These priorities, which focus on professional learning, curriculum and programming, and academic achievement, will serve to guide our efforts throughout the school year. Here is a brief synopsis of our relevant initiatives for the 2018-2019 school year:

Innovation Team

Our Innovation Team of STEAM, Library Media, and Challenge and Enrichment continues to develop exciting programming for all of our Hebron students. As they look to continue some of their successful endeavors such as Invention Convention, Future Problem Solvers, and Author Visits, the team will be incorporating some new initiatives for our students to enjoy as well. One of the most exciting new program offerings will be 3D printing. We are tremendously grateful to Wepco Plastics for assisting the Hebron Public Schools in acquiring a \$10,000 grant from the American Mold Manufacturing Association. This significant monetary award will fund the purchase of state-of-the-art 3D printing stations for each of our elementary schools.

• Student Leadership

We are very pleased to welcome the Bonstingl Leaders for the Future program to Hebron Elementary School for a second year in a row. An author and sought after keynote speaker and lecturer on the Worldwide Quality Learning Movement, Mr. John Jay Bonstingl, will facilitate his student leadership program that focuses on his Seven Personal Practices of Quality: Personal Leadership; True Partnership; Systems Focus; Process Orientation; Deeper Understanding; Love and Appreciation, No Matter What; and Ongoing Learning and Improvement. In fulfillment of the Bonstingl Leaders for the Future program, student leaders embark on a year-long journey of self-actualization as they develop their personal practices of quality while completing community service projects for Hebron Elementary School. A formal ceremony is held in the spring to recognize the accomplishments of the students.

• Next Generation Science Standards

Our teachers in Kindergarten through Grade 6 will be implementing new science units that align with the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). These new units of study reflect emerging trends in science education. The new units of study incorporate the realms of science, engineering, and technology into a broad set of performance expectations for our elementary school students.

• Cafeteria Program

Due to a growing program deficit and administrative regulations pertaining to school food service programs, the Hebron Board of Education cafeteria program will be partnering with EASTCONN for the 2018-2019 school year. It is important to note that the Hebron Public Schools will continue to maintain a self-operated cafeteria program with our current staff. EASTCONN will provide the district with Food Service Director oversight, program recommendations, food procurement, and dietetic menu planning services as part of the agreement.

• Preschool Study Committee

For the 2018-2019 school year, the Hebron Board Of Education has commissioned a formal study of the current Pre-Kindergarten program offerings for the Hebron Public Schools. Similar to the preschool presentation that is created by administration and program staff each year, the study will involve researching best practices in early childhood education and providing program recommendations for the future. This study will also help to inform our NAEYC accreditation review that is slated to occur in 2019-2020. The Pre-Kindergarten Study Committee will consist of parents, teachers, administrators, and representatives from the Town of Hebron School Readiness program.

• Homework Policy

In the Spring of 2018, the Hebron Public Schools Homework Study Committee conducted a formal review of the district's homework policy. In making recommendation for policy changes, the committee reviewed scholarly research related to the effectiveness of homework, conducted multiple stakeholder surveys, and researched BOE homework policies from various districts within and outside of Connecticut. A formal presentation of committee's study was given to the BOE in June, and a new policy was recommended for review. At its August BOE meeting, the policy was formally adopted and will be implemented this school year.

• Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports and Responsive Classroom

School climate and culture have been a primary district focus for several years. As we continue to build upon our current Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) programming, we are looking forward to enhancing our implementation of Responsive Classroom and its evidence-based approaches to cultivating safe, joyful, and engaging learning communities. Responsive Classroom will become a district-wide initiative for 2018-2019.

• Hebron Public Schools Website and Smartphone App

Although our mobile phone district app is not new to the Hebron Public Schools, we will be building upon its use during the 2018-2019 school year. Our district app will continue to enhance our communication with our Hebron families and our community. The app is free to download and is IOS and Android friendly. It provides families with live feeds, push notifications and bulletins, emergency alerts, and other important school information. Parents are also able to utilize the app to email teachers or call the school without needing to search our website for contact information. Beginning this year, the app will be our primary source for district and school communications.

• School Security Updates

Student and staff safety remains at the forefront of planning efforts made by the Board, administration, and our public safety officials. Annually, our District Safety Committee meets to review and update our emergency protocols for the school district. In addition, we conduct trainings with our local law enforcement to ensure that we continue to remain up-to-date and well-prepared as a district. Done every three to five years, our district will undergo a formal safety and security audit during the 2018-2019 school year. This audit will be a coordinated effort between administration, police, fire, and local emergency management officials.

In addition, the district will be implementing the Raptor Visitor Management system for the purpose of screening and documenting visitors entering our schools during the school day. To expedite entry into the school, please remember to bring a state-issued identification (typically a driver's license). The Raptor kiosk will scan your license, record the time of entry, and print a visitor badge to be worn in the school. We greatly appreciate your support and patience as we implement this new visitor entry process. It may take some time to get used to; however, we are enthusiastic about the potential of this system.

To close, I wanted to begin this year by thanking the community and all of our partners for your continued support of the Hebron Public Schools. Although there are many school opportunities for Hebron residents, we strongly believe that Gilead Hill School and Hebron Elementary School are providing an outstanding public elementary school program that rivals the academic and social experiences of our competitors. Further, the connections we foster with and among families is a great source of pride for us. We are honored and privileged to be serving you and your children, and we look forward to our continued partnership in education with you.

I look forward to another wonderful year, and it truly is a privilege to serve as your Superintendent of Schools.




This is a wonderful opportunity to participate in, and reap the benefits of, a cutting edge program. We are currently recruiting people for participation in this unique endeavor.
