I. Call to Order/Roll Call

Chair Tom Loto called the meeting to order at 7:37p.m. and noted all regular members were in attendance.

Members Present: Tom Loto (Chair), Christopher Frey (Vice-Chair), Dan Seremet, Joanna Chester, Jasmin Okugic

Staff Present: Jim Cordier (Wetlands Agent)

II. Approval of Minutes-February 9, 2023 (Regular Meeting)

A. C. Frey submitted the following clarification:

1. Section XIV.A (Liaison Reports, OSLAC) -The parcel discussed was in fact closed on December 1".

B. J. Chester submitted the following clarification:

1. Section XII. (Discussion of Airline Trail State Park Master Plan and Hebron Features Inventory) – The final sentence should read "She noted the work of Frank Zitkus and Maryanne Foote in gathering agricultural resources."

Motion by C. Frey and seconded by J. Chester to approve the minutes as amended. The motion passed unanimously.

III. Additions to Agenda

IV. Recognition of Guests

F. Zitkus reported Maple Fest is scheduled for March 18 & 19th. Several boards will be sharing a booth, including the Conservation Commission, OSLAC, and Parks and Rec. He urged members to contact the BoS and BoF to support funding for OSLAC as proposed in the budget.

V. Violations

A. Ralph and Lynn LaGuardia, 25 Mai Road -Violation of Conservation Easement Update- J. Cordier again reported no updates, though it seems a tentative agreement has been reached. Communication between the property owner's attorney and town's attorney has been slow.

VI. New Applications

A. Letter of Permission (No Permit Designation)- James and Cynthia Senes, 976 Church Street, Amston CT

This application concerns the cleanup and removal of debris and deadfall resulting from recent storms, as well as the removal of a standing dead tree, located roughly 25

feet from the applicant's house. The applicant's property abuts an easement located along Route 85, in addition to a well easement for a neighboring property. C. and J. Senes (applicants) were in attendance. After discussion, the Commission agreed the application posed no threat, though they noted their preference that any heavy equipment not traverse the easement, and that the resulting chipped wood be spread evenly. The Commission's draft letter of approval for the application is included below.

LETTER OF APPROVAL

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Senes,

Pursuant to the standard terms and conditions of the Conservation Easement pertaining to the property at 976 Church Street, Amston, CT, the Hebron Conservation Commission is designated as agent of that Conservation Easement. The preservation purpose of the foregoing charge over that land includes the insurance that "no trees or shrubs shall be cut, removed or destroyed within the Conservation Areas without the prior written approval of the Commission".

The Commission has deemed that your proposed cutting and removal of one dead tree that presents a threat to the safety of your house and property and the removal of felled trees and branches that occurred because of recent storm events are allowable and do not constitute a breach of the ecological intent or integrity of the designated Easement area.

In granting your request, the Commission asks that its Conservation and Inland Wetlands Agent be contacted prior to the commencement of work and be allowed to inspect the Easement area during and upon completion of your proposed project. We would also ask that you refrain from the usage of heavy vehicles or equipment in the Easement area during the conduct of your operations, that the stone wall in the north side of the Easement remain undisturbed, that native understory vegetation (if any) remain undisturbed, that woodchips be evenly spread if left on-site, and that you abide by the terms and conditions of the Well Easement (within the Conservation Easement) in favor of your neighbor at the abutting property located at 563 Amston Road, Colchester, CT during the tree and branch removal processes.

XII. Airline Trail State Park Master Plan

J. Cordier stated an application was submitted by CT RC&D to DEEP towards a recreational trails grant. The application, submitted with the support of the 12 member towns (including Hebron), would provide for organizational formation and marketing. He hopes to have an update next month.

XIII. Correspondence

Relevant correspondence was included in the agenda, with no further discussions necessary.

XIV. Liaison Reports

A. Open Space Land Acquisition Committee

C. Frey reported no updates since the last meeting. J. Cordier also noted no new developments, though he discussed a 61-acre property on Jones Street that could potentially link existing Open Space lands. The property is not currently available, and after discussion with the owner may or may not be in the future, though he stated his commitment to preserving the land.

B. Salmon River Watershed Partnership

C. Frey noted they met last month and talked about impacts from salt water, which the Commission then discussed as relates to Hebron and proposed DPW sites. J. Cordier urged members to avoid offering any positions or predispositions before

proposals are put before the Commission. Following a question from D. Seremet, C. Frey noted upticks in salt water numbers are often seen during winter, as well as low water periods. J. Cordier also noted the possibility of including some of Hebron's tributaries in a Salmon River/DEEP native brook trout/watercourse study.

J. Chester reported the annual conference was held today (March 9).

The Commission then discussed moving towards in-person meetings in the coming months.



- Site Preparation

- Weed whack/mow area. Cut back/remove invasives. To smother the area, we will lay sileage tarp.
- We will begin site preparation immediately upon approval of the project.

- Initial Plant Installation

- All plants will be planted bare root in local soil
- Primary installation will occur in late spring.
- Cardboard will be laid in bare areas to prevent invasive growth. This will be covered with fresh tree shavings.

Hebron's early days

In the area of land now called Raymond Brook Preserve, colonist William Shipman built his homesite in 1704-05. His father, Edward, was one of the "Saybrook Legatees" bequeathed land by Attawandunk, or Joshua, Native American Mohegan. In 1676, Attawandunk, son of Sachem Uncas, willed land to the Legatees in appreciation for the English settlers' assistance to the Mohegans against the Narragansett tribe. More settlers followed colonist William Shipman and Hebron became Connecticut's 41st town on May 26, 1708.
